





Two women gladiators fight for freedom within a profit-driven, brutally corrupt prison system.




The City We Became by N.K. Jemisin

In a post-eruption town, journals reveal a horrifying Bigfoot massacre, blending survival, horror, and shocking truths.




The Dispossessed by Ursula K. Le Guin

After a climate plague, interconnected characters across time and space struggle to rebuild and redefine humanity.




The Memory Police by Yoko Ogawa

In a future Mars society, a lowly Red infiltrates the ruling class to seek justice and revenge.




The Resisters by Gish Jen
