





Four strangers, connected by trees, unite to save the last of America's virgin forest in this environmental epic.




## Less (2018) by Andrew Sean Greer

A failed novelist turns fifty and escapes a broken relationship by traveling, encountering romance, mishaps, and self-discovery.




## The Underground Railroad (2017) by Colson Whitehead

A grieving New Yorker's obsession with a captivating painting leads him into a dangerous world of art and wealth.




## The Orphan Master's Son (2013) by Adam Johnson
